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EFFICIENCY OF RESOURCE UTILIZATION: THE CASE OF BROILER PRODUCTION BY URBAN FARMERS IN UYO METROPOLIS.

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Abstract

Output – oriented technical efficiency indices were estimated by stochastic production frontier functions to survey data obtained from 70 broiler farmers in Uyo necropolis, Akwa Ibom State with the aid of questionnaire. Asymptotic parameter estimates were evaluated to describe efficiency determinants using the maximum likelihood estimation technique. The findings reveal a mean efficiency index of 0.81 implying that output from broiler production could be increased by 19 percent using available technology.

Introduction

Livestock is quite a common sight, especially in the open spaces in the outskirts of most cities. By far, poultry is the most commonly kept livestock and over 70% of those keeping livestock are reported to keep chickens (Armar – Klemesu and Maxwell, 2000). The main reasons and objective for keeping livestock particularly in urban areas include generating income, keeping animals as an economic asset, having access to dung as a source of manure and maximum production with as little costs as possible (Nunan 2000, Van Eekeren et al, 1995). Keeping broiler poultry requires efficient use of resources to optimize output. Empirical studies (Etim et al, 2005; and Udoh and Akintola, 2001; Udoh 2000; Udoh and Etim (forth coming) agree that farming uses available resources as efficiently as possible to optimize agricultural production.

Inefficiency of resource use and utilization can seriously jeopardize and hamper food production and security. This paper aims at measuring technical efficiency of small scale broiler production by urban farmers in Uyo metropolis, Akwa Ibom State.

Methodology

The study was conducted in Uyo Local Government Area, the capital city of Akwa Ibom State Nigeria. It has an estimated population of 234,615 (NPC, 1991; FOS, 1999). The area is located between latitude 5°17¹ and 5°27¹ North and longitude 7°27¹ and 7°58¹ East. Uyo covers an area approximately 35 square Kilometers animal precipitation ranges from 2000 – 2000m per annum. This rainfall regime received in most parts of the state encourages farming through-out the year (Etim and Ofem, 2005).

Data used for this study are mainly primary and were obtained from farmers, using structured questionnaire, in 2005. Specifically, 70 broiler farmers were randomly selected from urban and peri-urban zones of Uyo.

The Empirical model to determine the efficiency of resource use in the broiler farmers was by the use the stochastic frontier production function defined as

The model specified is estimated by maximum likelihood method using FRONTIER 4.1 software. Results on table I show ML estimates and inefficiency determinants of the sigma square(0.5398) is statistically significant and different from zero at $\alpha = 0.01$. Results indicate a good fit and the correctness of the specified distribution assumption of the error term. The variance defined as λ is estimated to be as high as 82.89 percent implying that the systematic influences that are unexplained by the production function are relatively dominant sources of random errors. Thus, the existence of technical inefficiency among the broiler farmers accounts for about 83 percent of the variation in the output level of the broilers kept. Feed appears to be the most important factor of production with an elasticity of 0.3514, followed by labour and land with elasticity of 0.2115 and 0.5149 respectively.

The estimated coefficient of the determinants of efficiency show that except for Age and education, the coefficients of other variables were highly significant. The efficiency indices across the broiler farm on table II show considerable variation as the technical efficiency of all the sampled broiler farms are less than one.

Conclusion

The study analyzed the efficiency level of broiler production using the stochastic parameter estimation techniques. The farm specific technical efficiency distribution reveals a mean technical efficiency of 0.81 implying that production can still be increased by 19 percent using available technology.
